Memory Verses: 1 Corinthians 15:51-52 (CSB)

"Listen, I am telling you a mystery: We will not all fall asleep, but we will all be changed, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet."

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

SINGLES

1. How does the hope of the future resurrection impact the way you navigate singleness in a culture that often places a high value on romantic relationships?
2. In what ways can you actively participate in the life of the church and find fulfillment in your identity in Christ, even if societal norms often emphasize family life?
3. How can singles encourage one another to remain grounded in faith and actively engage in end times discussions within the context of your unique life situations?

SINGLE PARENT

1. How does the concept of resurrection give hope and strength to single parents facing the challenges of raising children alone?
2. How do you approach this topic in communication with your child?
3. How can single parents navigate the complexities of dating and relationships while remaining grounded in your faith and the hope of Christ's return?

TEENS

1. What does the resurrection mean to you?
2. How often do you think about eternity? What do you think about it?
3. What's the most difficult thing to read in this passage?

YOUNG ADULT

1. As you face transitions in career, relationships, and identity, how can the hope of resurrection provide stability and purpose?
2. What does the resurrection mean to you?
3. How do you actively engage with end times discussions and apply these principles to your evolving life circumstances?

MARRIED COUPLES

1. How does the concept of resurrection influence the way you navigate challenges and conflicts in your relationship?
2. In what practical ways can you foster a home environment that reflects the eternal hope found in 1 Corinthians 15:51-52?
3. Each of you name a loved one you look forward to seeing in eternity. Tell each other why.

FAMILY

1. How can you incorporate the concept of resurrection into your daily routines and discussions?
2. Talk about loved ones who have gone to be with God. How does this bring you hope?
3. Ask your children what they think about the hope of the resurrection.

WIDOWED

1. How can the hope of resurrection bring comfort in your loss?
2. What part of this passage is most comforting? Why?
3. How might the concept of eternal reunion impact your decisions and priorities?

GEM PARENTS

1. How can the hope of resurrection influence the perspective of parents raising GEM children?
2. Rate your understanding of end times 1-10. What would help you understand it better?
3. How do you plan on explaining the resurrection hope to your GEM child?

NEWLYWEDS

1. How can the concept of resurrection shape your foundation and goals as newlyweds?
2. How has this text on eternity made you think about your marriage?
3. What do you think Paul is saying when he says we will not all fall asleep?

EMPTY NESTERS

1. How can the concept of resurrection influence your priorities and pursuits as you enter a new phase of life?
2. What does the resurrection mean to you in this stage of life?
3. On a scale of 1-10, how much would you say you understand the end times and the Bible? Why this rating?

2. What does the resurrection mean to you in this stage of life?
3. What do you think Paul is saying when he says we will not all fall asleep?
