# Who am I Listening To?

Acts 17:16-34 - The Universe vs. God

This study explores Paul's encounter with the philosophers of Athens. Surrounded by idols and competing worldviews, Paul calls them to turn from vague spiritual seeking toward the living God. Today, we often hear people speak of trusting "the universe" or "positive energy." This study challenges us to ask: Are we listening to the universe or to God?

### I. Why This Study?

### A. Objective:

- 1. To explore how Acts 17:16-34 reveals the difference between cultural spirituality and God's voice.
- 2. To examine how vague spiritual beliefs can block true faith in Christ.
- 3. To gain biblical wisdom for discerning the voices that shape our worldview.

#### B. Relevance:

- 1. Like Athens, our world today worships many "gods"—from success and self-help to nature and the universe.
- 2. This passage challenges believers to tune out the noise of culture and listen for the voice of the Creator.
- 3. Paul's speech at the Areopagus gives us a model for engaging a spiritual but confused world.

A. **Gregory of Nazianzus (Church Father):** "It is madness to revere the creation and ignore the Creator."

B. **Irenaeus of Lyons (Church Father):** "The glory of God is the human fully alive—and fully alive only in the knowledge of God."

- C. **Dr. Yolanda Pierce:** "The noise of the world competes with God's voice—but our souls know the difference." (In My Grandmother's House)
- D. **Dr. Barbara Holmes:** "Spirituality divorced from the God of justice and resurrection is powerless against evil." (Joy Unspeakable)
- E. **Dr. Mitzi J. Smith:** "The gospel disrupts our comfort and forces us to confront what we really believe about life and death." (I Found God in Me)
- F. **Dr. Reggie Williams:** "The god of the market and the god of the philosophers offer no hope—but Christ crucified does."
- G. **Dr. Kelly Brown Douglas:** "God is not a cosmic vending machine responding to our positive thoughts. God is justice embodied."

### V. Prayer Focus

- A. Pray for wisdom to discern the voices shaping your beliefs.
- B. Ask God for courage to resist cultural philosophies and spiritual half-truths.
- C. Pray for ears to hear the voice of the living God and respond in faith.

## VI. Key Takeaway

The universe is not God. Cultural spirituality can soothe but cannot save. Only the Creator, revealed in Jesus Christ, speaks words of life, hope, and resurrection. The question is not just what we believe but who we are listening to.
