Standing Strong When God Shifts the Room

Acts 22:30–23:11

Focus: Paul stands before the Sanhedrin, caught between rival factions—yet God reminds him that his purpose is still intact. This study explores what it means to stand firm when your surroundings change, and to trust God’s control in hostile spaces.

I. Why This Study?

A. Objective:

1. To examine how Paul maintains clarity and composure in a shifting and hostile environment.
2. To explore the dynamics of spiritual resilience when political, religious, or relational spaces become divided.
3. To encourage trust in God’s sovereignty even when the room seems against you.
